Country Face Cuts or Closure in the Wake of Republicans
Passing the Largest Cuts to Health Care in History*

Across America, over 1,000 hospitals, nursing homes, maternity wards, and providers have now closed, cut services, or are at risk of doing so in the year since Donald Trump and Congressional Republicans ripped over \$1 trillion from Medicaid and the Affordable Care Act (ACA) to bankroll tax breaks for billionaires and big corporations.

The wreckage spans every corner of the country. Hospitals have been forced to slash services, clinics have shuttered, and nursing homes have turned away the seniors who need care most. Maternity wards have gone dark, abandoning expectant moms in care deserts where delivering a baby has become a life-or-death gamble. Rural communities are hemorrhaging jobs. Urban hospitals are teetering on the brink.

And the toll keeps mounting. More than [15 million Americans](#), including seniors, children, and Americans with disabilities, are at risk of losing the coverage they depend on. More than 25,000 health care workers have been [laid off](#). Families are facing higher premiums, higher out-of-pocket costs, and impossible choices about whether they can afford care at all.

What began as the largest cut to health care in American history has become a nationwide health care crisis. One year later, the consequences of Republicans' health care cuts are impossible to ignore as the fallout spreads, decimating the American health care system and local economies, forcing working families to pay the price.

By the Numbers:

- **Over [1,000](#) hospitals, clinics, and nursing homes have shut down, cut services, or are at risk of doing so after Trump and Republicans gutted over [\\$1 trillion](#) from Medicaid and the ACA — forcing Americans to travel further for maternity care and emergency rooms, face longer wait times, and pay more for their care.**
 - Over [400](#) hospitals are at risk of closure or cuts after H.R. 1.
 - [80+](#) hospital wards have already shuttered, from maternity wards to pediatric units after H.R. 1.
 - Over [360](#) clinics have been forced to close after H.R. 1.
 - More than [30](#) nursing homes have shuttered after H.R. 1 and [hundreds more](#) are at risk.
 - [Multiple hospitals](#) have converted to standalone emergency departments after H.R. 1.
 - [More than 15](#) hospitals have closed or announced closure after GOP cuts after H.R. 1.
- **[92 percent](#) of hospital leaders expect Medicaid cuts to have a significant financial impact.**
- **Medicaid accounts for [one-fifth](#) of spending on hospitals, [one-fifth](#) of hospital discharges, and at least [one in five](#) inpatient days in nearly every state.**
- **By gutting Medicaid, Republicans gutted the largest payor of [maternal health](#), [mental health](#), and [nursing home care](#) in the country. Now, [expectant mothers](#), [seniors](#), and**

[children struggling with mental health](#) are forced to pay the price as maternity wards, nursing homes, and treatment centers shutter:

- Nearly [40](#) maternity wards have shuttered after H.R. 1.
- Multiple [inpatient psychiatric units](#), [eating disorder clinics](#), [substance use treatment facilities](#), and [therapy centers](#) have been forced to close.
- **The health care industry is the [largest employer](#) in the country, but thanks to Republicans, an estimated [477,000](#) health workers will lose their jobs as a result of Medicaid cuts.** Republicans are undermining an industry that employs millions of community servants, from doctors to nurses to social workers, to hand out tax breaks to the ultrawealthy.

The GOP–Manufactured Health Care Crisis Is Rippling Through Hospitals and Clinics Nationwide

Cash-strapped hospitals, emergency departments, maternity wards, and nursing homes have already begun to close in [48 states](#) across the country since Republicans passed their big, ugly bill, leaving thousands in their communities stranded without reliable care. In Jersey City, New Jersey, a hospital that had supported the community for [over 150 years](#) shuttered under the pressure of Medicaid cuts, leaving a city of nearly 300,000 residents with only one emergency room. In Clinton, Iowa, expecting moms are now stranded an hour or more from the nearest maternity ward after their local maternity ward [shuttered](#). A network of [26 mental health centers](#) across rural Arkansas was forced to shutter. Thanks to Trump and Republicans' big, ugly bill, this is only the beginning. As millions more lose their Medicaid and ACA coverage due to onerous paperwork requirements and deep cuts to provider taxes and state-directed payments taking effect in 2027 and 2028, the crisis will only worsen, leaving working Americans in the dust.

“This unprecedented level of Medicaid cuts would devastate the program, undermining the ability of essential hospitals to provide critical services, including trauma care, behavioral health, maternal health, and public health emergency response. These hospitals, which already operate on thin margins, cannot absorb such losses without reducing services or closing their doors altogether. We urge lawmakers to reconsider this dangerous path. Over a Dozen Hospitals Were Forced to Shutter Completely, Leaving Their Communities

Reeling. [Fourteen hospitals](#) across 13 states have been forced to close after the passage of the Republicans’ big, ugly bill, leaving patients and their families in turmoil. Hospitals from South Dakota to New Jersey are feeling the pain. Families in Derby, Kansas, where Rock Regional Hospital closed, [worry they won’t be able to get to the nearest hospital in time](#) if they have a heart attack or an accident. A New Jersey senior with a heart condition and no personal means of transportation [fears for his life](#) after his local hospital and emergency room closed. A farming community in California has been [devastated by the closure](#) of the only hospital for 30 miles. These hospital closures and the consequences on their communities will only worsen as deeper GOP cuts go into effect in 2027 and 2028.

Over 150 Hospitals Turned to Layoffs, Ward, and Clinic Closures to Avoid Total Shutdowns.

Over [400 hospitals](#) have been identified as at risk of cuts or closure since Republicans passed the big, ugly bill. The increased financial pressure of GOP Medicaid cuts means that hospitals are being forced to cut staff, eliminate services, and shutter entire wards to avoid closure. After Trump and Republicans' \$1 trillion in Medicaid cuts, over [150 hospitals](#) have had to cut staff, essential services, or close wards entirely. Rural hospitals are being forced to shutter their inpatient services and become standalone emergency departments to survive in states from Pennsylvania to New York. Many [maternity wards, pediatric units, and emergency rooms](#) have been caught in the crossfire of GOP cuts. A maternity ward in Lavonia, Georgia, [closed](#) in October, forcing moms to travel 45 minutes to an hour and a half to the nearest labor and delivery unit. In a small town in Kansas, the local hospital was forced to [close its behavioral health unit](#), leaving psychiatric patients facing major crises an hour away from inpatient care. These layoffs, cuts, and closures have devastating effects on employment in their communities and create new hurdles in accessing care close to home.

Counties Are Raising Property Taxes to Try to Save Their Local Hospitals. Communities from [California](#) to [Minnesota](#) to [Alabama](#) are desperate to save their hospitals in the wake of GOP cuts. Counties across the country are instituting new taxes to stop their hospitals from closing. Residents of a rural county in southwestern Alabama are paying [higher property taxes](#) to prevent their local hospitals from shuttering. Minnesotans are paying [higher property taxes](#) to make up for federal Medicaid cuts. California's Santa Clara County [approved](#) tax hikes to fund hospitals after federal Medicaid cuts. Another ballot measure to do the same in [Contra Costa County](#) was put up for a vote. Countless hospitals still are [begging](#) for taxpayer-funded infusions from their state government to stay afloat because the Republicans' meager pity fund doesn't make up for the cuts. Lawmakers in Minnesota are weighing an increase in [sales tax](#) to prevent Hennepin County Medical Center, a [major trauma center](#) in Minneapolis, from closing. A network of community health clinics in Los Angeles County is pushing for a new [sales tax](#) for more funding after Congress gutted Medicaid, which 80 percent of their patients rely on.

Countless Towns Are Left Without Clinics. By gutting Medicaid, Republicans cut a critical source of funding for primary care providers in rural communities, low-income communities, and mental health providers nationwide. Over [370 clinics](#) have shuttered since the passage of the big, ugly bill, exacerbating the nationwide primary care and mental health provider shortage, leaving patients reeling nationwide. In a small town in New Hampshire, patients are [mourning the loss](#) of the town's only health center. A wife worries about the loss of care for her husband, a volunteer firefighter who has fought cancer. In Montgomery, Minnesota, a woman who has lived in the town for over 70 years is [heartbroken](#) to witness the closure of its last clinic. In Wisconsin, young women are left [scrambling for mental health care](#) after the sudden closure of their mental health clinic. One of the women relied on the clinic for a

specialized depression treatment that few facilities offer.

Closures and Cuts Are Shattering Local Economies. Health care is the largest employer in the country. By gutting over \$1 trillion from Medicaid and the ACA, Republicans are undermining an industry that [drives job creation](#) to hand out tax breaks to the ultrawealthy. Since the passage of the big, ugly bill, [over 70](#) hospitals and health systems have been forced to make layoffs. An estimated [477,000](#) health workers will lose their jobs as a result of GOP cuts to Medicaid. This year, an estimated [150,000](#) health care jobs are expected to be lost due to Republicans' eliminating tax credits for working families alone. Hospitals specifically employ [10 percent](#) of all employees in rural counties. When rural hospitals close, communities can lose a staggering number of jobs, both [within and outside](#) of the health care sector. Studies find unemployment rates increased by up to [3.1 percent](#) following rural hospital closures in a community. Job losses can have a negative impact on the local tax base and shrink the resources available for schools and other public services, and make it difficult for communities to attract new employers and jobs, leading to widespread economic turmoil for communities at a time when families are already struggling with a rising cost of living and new tariffs. Researchers estimate the cuts will shrink state economies by a collective [\\$113 billion](#). Here are some examples of recent facility closures and cuts, and the subsequent job loss:

The Devastating Consequences of Republicans' Unprecedented Cuts to Health Care

Patients Face Dangerously Long Wait Times for Ambulances and at the ER. When hospitals or emergency departments close, emergency cases are [diverted](#) to other hospitals, leading to longer travel times for ambulances, overcrowding in emergency rooms, and longer waits to see a doctor. Studies find that ambulance transport times increase by [11 to 16 minutes](#) following a rural hospital closure — a life

or death difference for patients having a stroke, heart attack, or internal bleeding. In Delaware County, Pennsylvania, ambulance transportation times skyrocketed by [400 percent](#) following local hospital closures. Some hospitals cite a [27 percent increase](#) in emergency department patient volume after the closure of nearby facilities, meaning excruciating wait times before patients can get the care they need, as well as [worse health outcomes](#).

Mothers Are Forced to Travel Farther to Give Birth, and Seniors Are Forced to Travel Farther For Surgery. By passing the largest cuts to health care in history, Republicans put countless moms and babies farther away from the care they need at a time when [35 percent](#) of counties already lack birthing hospitals and birth centers. GOP cuts have already shuttered nearly 40 maternity care units and put over [140 units](#) at risk of closing their doors since the passage of the big, ugly bill. Seniors in need of surgery will also have to [travel farther](#) and [wait longer](#) to get critical care due to the GOP's big, ugly bill. Overwhelmed emergency departments also mean [longer wait times](#) to receive surgery, whether it is a coronary bypass to treat a heart attack or an emergency appendectomy. Delays in surgical treatment often result in a [higher likelihood of complications](#) and greater mortality.

Republican Medicaid Cuts Are Fanning the Flames of America's Mental Health Crisis.

Republicans gutted nearly \$1 trillion from the U.S.'s [largest payer](#) for mental health, Medicaid, to pay for tax breaks for billionaires and big corporations. Medicaid covers [nearly a third](#) of adults living with a serious mental health condition and [half](#) of all adults with opioid use disorder. [Over 70](#) mental health clinics, behavioral health facilities, and inpatient psychiatric units have been forced to shutter across the country since the GOP gutted Medicaid, cutting off communities from critical care. An estimated [156,000](#) Americans will get cut off from opioid use disorder treatment, and overdose rates among them will double, leading to [1,000](#) additional fatal overdoses each year due to Republican cuts.

Closures And Coverage Losses Result in Higher Bills for Everyone, Regardless of Where They Get Their Coverage. Since Republicans are kicking millions of Americans off their coverage, emergency rooms will become packed with patients who are unable to pay their bills due to loss of health coverage, resulting in hospitals dealing with an estimated [\\$63 billion](#) in uncompensated care. The cost of this care will likely then get passed on to others through higher bills and increased premiums, [increasing costs for everyone](#). Costs will also spike for everyone as rural hospitals [close](#), driving up costs at nearby facilities by an estimated [\\$500](#) per hospital stay. Everyone will pay the price because Republicans put tax breaks for billionaires and big corporations above the needs of working people.

Struggling Hospitals Are Bought Up by Monopolies That Drive Up Costs. The [Health Care Affordability Lab](#) at Yale found that [over the past 20 years](#), there have been approximately 1,300 mergers among the country's 5,000 hospitals. While hospital consolidations have been shown to help [stabilize](#)

financially vulnerable hospitals, studies show hospital mergers can drive up costs as much as [65 percent](#). As more and more hospitals dip into financial distress due to Republicans' Medicaid cuts, mergers and consolidations to save hospitals and health systems could become more common. This could disproportionately impact rural areas, which already rank [highest](#) for areas with concentrated hospital markets, and make supporting more than one hospital in the community difficult.

In Richmond, Virginia, experts like Ms. Alam sounded the alarm in a [68-page report](#) that Virginia's rural hospitals "face growing risk of financial distress." Republican Medicaid cuts will "significantly decrease the flow of federal dollars into Virginia's health care system," they wrote, which would deepen the crisis. Thirteen of Virginia's thirty-six rural hospitals "are at either immediate risk of closure or at risk of closure."

"Closures disproportionately occur in high-poverty, socially vulnerable counties, affecting populations that have the fewest resources to absorb those access barriers," said Alam. [\[WJHL\]](#)

In Fort Smith, Arkansas, Zoe Thompson, who is 20 weeks pregnant, is navigating her second pregnancy in a maternal health desert after Baptist Health announced it would shut down its labor and delivery unit. Midway through her pregnancy, she has been forced to make new plans and switch providers.

"Having a baby is scary... I feel like having to experience even more with this change and more scariness," Thompson said. *"I'm kind of freaking out, to be honest."* [\[5NewsOnline\]](#)



How GOP Policies Are Hurting Local Hospitals And the Patients Who Rely On Them

GOP Policies Will Kick Over 15 Million Americans off Their Coverage, Increasing the Burden of Uncompensated Care and Driving Up Health Care Costs for Everyone. The GOP health care cuts take a sledgehammer to Medicaid and the ACA, which will raise costs and make health care unaffordable for millions of seniors and families. [Over 15 million Americans](#), from seniors to children to people with disabilities, are expected to lose their health care. Nearly four million Americans who relied on Medicaid or the ACA have already lost their coverage since Republicans passed the big, ugly bill. When people are thrown off their health care, they [won't seek treatment](#) for their chronic conditions until they're severe and more costly to treat. This means more ER visits, more late-stage cancer diagnoses, and more complications from lack of preventive care. Emergency rooms will become packed with patients who are unable to pay their bills due to loss of health coverage, forcing [higher bills](#) for everyone, regardless of where they get their coverage. A recent study by the Urban Institute found the House reconciliation bill will result in hospitals dealing with an estimated [\\$63 billion](#) in uncompensated care. The financial burden of uncompensated care for those will likely then get passed on to others through higher bills and increased premiums, [increasing costs](#) for everyone. Health care costs will also spike for everyone as rural hospitals [close](#), driving up costs at nearby facilities by an estimated \$500 per hospital stay. Everyone will pay the price because Republicans put tax breaks for billionaires and big corporations above the needs of working people.

Republicans Gutted the Funding That Helps Hospitals Keep Their Doors Open. The GOP health care cuts severely limit the ways states fund Medicaid and reimburse hospitals for care, including provider taxes and state-directed payments. These new restrictions will shutter struggling hospitals and make it nearly impossible for states to manage the burden of the largest cuts to Medicaid in history without kicking millions off their coverage. [49 states](#) rely on “provider taxes” or taxes on health care providers to finance their share of Medicaid spending and draw down federal funds to make sure providers are adequately reimbursed. Republicans' provider tax restrictions will cut federal funding for state Medicaid programs by [\\$240 billion](#). Republicans also [restricted](#) states' ability to provide state-directed payments. [State-directed payments](#) boost funding to Medicaid medical providers to preserve access to health care and ensure facilities have the resources to stay open and meet the unique needs of their communities. Each year, state-directed payments provided hospitals, nursing homes, and other facilities with [\\$110 billion](#) in critical funding, funding which is now at risk. The Republicans' big, ugly bill also eliminated critical financial incentives for states to expand Medicaid at a time when hospitals in non-expansion states are deeply struggling. [10 states](#) have yet to fully expand Medicaid: Georgia,

Wisconsin, Texas, Florida, Tennessee, Wyoming, Kansas, Alabama, Mississippi, and South Carolina. [69 hospitals](#) across these states are already at grave risk of closure and are now further than ever from the financial relief they need to survive since Republicans eliminated the critical incentive to expand Medicaid.

Republicans’ Fund to Help Hospitals Survive Is a Joke. Over [330](#) rural hospitals are at risk of cuts or closure after Republicans gutted over [\\$130 billion](#) from rural health care in their big, ugly bill. Entire communities are finding themselves without nearby care. Patients are driving hours for basic doctor visits and prescriptions. Local economies are suffering as health care jobs vanish. But the rural hospital fund falls far short of what rural communities need, leaving families stranded without access to life-saving care. Republicans’ so-called “Rural Health Transformation Fund” will do little to nothing to help rural health care providers and provide zero assistance to the urban hospitals that make up [56 percent](#) of those most at risk from cuts. The pity fund already failed to scratch the surface of the hundreds of billions in cuts to hospitals, before the Trump administration dictated that no more than [15 percent](#) of the meager funds can be used to help rural health providers stay afloat. The consequences of the GOP’s big, ugly bill are already unfolding and will only worsen as [deeper cuts to hospitals](#) take effect in 2027 and 2028. The GOP pity fund will fail to stop the bleeding.

Methodology: Our team monitors news sources daily for announcements of hospitals at risk, service cuts, ward closures, clinic closures, nursing home closures, and full hospital closures. Providers at risk of closure or cuts are identified using rigorous analyses from academic institutions and think tanks such as the Sheps Center at UNC-Chapel Hill. Closures refer to those announced after Republicans gutted over \$1 trillion from Medicaid and the Affordable Care Act.
